1. This is a first course in calculus. It covers functions, slope, rate of change, the derivative, trig, log, and exponential functions, curve sketching, optimization, the antiderivative, the definite integral, and the fundamental theorem. Prerequisites are a basic knowledge of arithmetic and algebra. The lectures will follow the text. Almost all sections will be covered.
2. The course meets three times a week. If you miss a class for any reason, you are still responsible for the material covered in that class.
3. The homework problems are the heart and soul of the course. They will be assigned from the text at the end of each class. Solutions will be discussed in the following class. Answers are in the text.
4. There will be six 40 minute in-class exams and a final. The exam schedule is

5. All exams and the final will be closed-book. A reference sheet will be allowed for the final. The exams and the final will consist essentially of homework problems. You must take the exams and the final, and you must take them when they are scheduled. There will be no makeup exams and no exemptions from the final for any reason. 6. Your final grade will be based on the exams (60%) and the final (40%). I will drop the lowest exam.
